

First mural

- **Ducks**

These are probably the only ducks in Headington, but they fill an awkward corner

- **Row of cottages**

This row of pink cottages is in St Andrew's Road .

- **St Andrew's Church**

St Andrew's Church is Headington's oldest surviving building: some parts of it date from the twelfth century

- **Cafe Allo Allo**

Café Bonjour at 134 London Road was newly open in 2002

- **Flower shop**

"The Garden" florist is at 79 London Road

- **Art and Tiles shop**

Leopard Press has been selling artist's materials and tiles at 12 Windmill Road since 1988

- **Bathroom shop**

Blanchford's in Windmill Road was the only Headington shop that sold bathrooms in 2002

- **Dry Cleaners**

Sketchley Cleaners (later Johnson's) were at 102 London Road, and Regency Cleaners are still at Simon House, Windmill Road

- **Travel Agent**

Oxonian Travel at 63 London Road closed in 2007 and is now the Subway shop, but the Co-op Travel Care at 122–136 London Road survives

- **Café Blanc**

Café Noir has now closed, and the building is occupied by Jacob's Chop House

- **Butcher's shop**

Daly's, Headington's last butcher, was still at 77 London Road in 2002, but the shop was rebuilt soon afterwards and is now Scott Fraser estate agents

- **Newsagent**

W. H. Smith at 99 London Road was taken over by the Crown Group in about 2005

- **Snack bar**

This is probably the Lebanese sandwich shop at 123 London Road (now Mojo's). Note that the graffiti artist who has added a tag has respected the picture and put it on the blind

- **Scene in Bury Knowle Park**

Bury Knowle Park was opened in 1932, and is still unspoilt

- **Footballers**

The footballers appeared on the horizontal underground section of the subway. Oxford United moved out of the Manor Ground in 2002, the year the subway was painted, and the Manor Hospital now stands on the site

- **John Radcliffe Hospital and ambulance**

The John Radcliffe Hospital came to Headington in several phases: the maternity department opened in 1971 and the main hospital in 1979. It has grown considerably since 2002

- **"Notice board"**

This *trompe l'oeuil* notice board cleverly mimics the central Headington notice boards, which were put up around the time that the subway was painted

- **Greengrocer**

Topfruits, Headington's last greengrocer, was at 106 London Road, and closed soon after the subway was painted. The shop is now Up & Running

- **Jaqualine Hand made Clothes**

This probably represents Japlene's clothes shop at 6 Windmill Road

- **Bank**

Headington had six banks in 2002 (Abbey National, Barclays, HSBC, two branches of Lloyds TSB, NatWest)

- **Hairdresser**

Headington had nine hairdressers in 2002 (Accent, Africare, Les Amis, Cut 'n' Create, Joanne, Matthew Clulee, Salon Scandinavia, Sir, Vente Tsunami)

- **Estate agent**

Headington had seven estate agents in 2002 (Adkin's, Allen & Harris, Buckell & Ballard, Chancellor's, Charles Lawson, Connell's, and Lee & Lindars)

- **Boulangerie/Patisserie**

This represents La Croissanterie at 3–5 Old High Street and La Patisserie Imperiale (now Yummy) at 148 London Road

- **Wine shop**

Headington still had two off-licences in 2002: Thresher's at 15 Old High Street and Oddbins at 83 London Road

- **Bed shop**

Headington Beds, which had been at 11 Windmill Road since the 1990s, closed down shortly after the subway was painted

- **Antique shop**

Barclay Antiques has been on the corner of Windmill Road and Margaret Road for many years

- **Oxford Brookes University**

In 1992 Oxford Polytechnic became Oxford Brookes University, named after John Henry Brookes

- **Scenes from Tolkien**

Characters from *The Hobbit* whose author, J.R.R. Tolkien, lived at 76 Sandfield Road in Headington from 1953 to 1968

- **Woodland scene**

A woodland scene from a child's tale
