

## Second mural

- **Scenes from C. S. Lewis**

Scenes from *The Lion, The Witch, and the Wardrobe* by C.S. Lewis, who lived in Headington (at The Kilns in Risinghurst) from 1930 until his death in 1963

- **The Windmill**

A large windmill stood on the site of the present Matthew Wigglesworth House (formerly Windmill House) in Windmill Road from the thirteenth century to about 1880

- **Greetings card shop**

“Just Cards” and “Special Days” both sold cards in Windmill Road

- **Cake shop**

“The Queen of Hearts” (now Queens) at 1 Windmill Road

- **Optician**

Gardiner’s Optician is at 5 Manor Buildings and Robert Stanley at 137 London Road

- **Chinese takeaway**

The Shanghai House has been at 127 London Road since 1972 and is Headington’s oldest takeaway

- **The Shark**

Bill Heine put a shark in his roof at 2 New High Street on 9 August 1986, and it soon became Headington’s most famous landmark

- **Pizza**

Domino’s Pizza has been in the Holyoake Hall building since at least 1990

- **Time & Sparkle**

“Time & Elegance” was a much-loved jeweller at 9A Windmill Road. It closed in 2007 and the shop is now a tattoo studio

- **Chemist**

Hornby's Pharmacy was at 8 Windmill Road

- **Picture-framing shop**

The Oxford Framing Gallery is at 4 Manor Buildings, Osler Road

- **Video shop**

Blockbuster's was at 73–75 London Road, later Morrisons

- **Fish & chip shop**

The Mediterranean Fish Bar was at 91A London Road. The shop, built in 1937, was demolished in 2007 and has since been rebuilt

- **Headington Post Office**

Headington's main post office has been at 142 London Road since 1942, but is planned for closure in early 2016

- **Underneath the road**

- **Footballers**

Again the footballers play for ever in their subterranean world. Headington United Football Club was founded in 1893 by Headington's vicar and doctor to keep local boys out of mischief, and it became Oxford United in 1960

- **Bike shop**

G. H. Williams's bike shop moved to 115 London Road in the mid-1950s. George Henry Williams founded his shop in Headington in 1912, and his son, G.H. Williams junior, was still working in the shop at the age of 95 when it closed in 2006. The shop is now Euro Foods

- **Garden Centre**

Samuel West opened his nursery at 74 Windmill Road in 1893, and its land spread over what is now Norton Close. It later became S. West & Sons Garden Centre, which closed in 2005. The site is now housing

- **Fashion shop**

The "Monaco" dress shop is at 7 Old High Street

- **Flower shop**

The Jem-i-Ni flower shop, which closed in 2008, was at 121 London Road

- **Plastics shop**

Plastic goods were sold by A–Z Household Goods at 142 London Road, and Clover's at 2a Windmill Road

- **Interior shop**

Annie Sloan's interior design shop was at 117 London Road until 2010

- **Wedding shop**

Pronuptia Bridal Wear came to Headington in about 2000 and moved out in 2007 to make way for Starbucks

- **The Embers**

The Flame Persian restaurant was at 3 The Parade, Windmill Road, from about 2000 to 2006. The building is now the Dong Dong Noodle Bar

- **Design shop**

"Oxford Design" used to be at 122a London Road (now a nail bar)

- **Jubilee emblem**

The Queen celebrated her Golden Jubilee in 2002, the year the subway art was created, and this event is remembered here, with music wafting across from the "Headington Singers" group
